# Music at Ellwood Community Primary School

#### Intent

At Ellwood Community Primary School, we aim to instil a love of music in our children. We value music because it is a powerful and unique art form. Music boosts creativity and supports development in social skills, self-discipline and confidence. It is our belief that high-quality music lessons and experiences inspire children to have a passion for music, both past and present.

Our curriculum is designed so that all children:

- perform, listen to, review and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great composers and musicians
- learn to sing and to use their voices, to create and compose music on their own and with others
- have the opportunity to learn a musical instrument, use technology appropriately and have the opportunity to progress to the next level of musical excellence
- understand and explore how music is created, produced and communicated, including through the inter-related dimensions: pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, timbre, texture, structure and appropriate musical notations.

The programme of study is a spiral curriculum to develop knowledge and skills, where prior learning is revisited, reinforced and extended year on year.

## **Implementation**

### **Planning**

- Long term: National Curriculum and Development Matters, two-year rolling programme of topics taken from a comprehensive scheme of work Charanga Each Unit of Work comprises the of strands of musical learning which correspond with the national curriculum for music: Listening and Appraising, Musical Activities (Warm-up Games, Optional Flexible Games, Singing, Playing instruments, Improvisation, Composition) and Performing
- Medium term: Teachers follow the scheme of work, covering the objectives in the Skills and Knowledge breakdown for Music.

## **Teaching and learning**

- All activities are based around a song.
- Games embed the Interrelated Dimensions of Music through repetition
- Singing is at the heart of all the musical learning
- Playing instruments with the song to be learnt tuned/un-tuned classroom percussion. A sound-before-symbol approach is used but scores are provided as an understanding of notation is introduced to the children
- Improvising with the song using voices and instruments occurs in some Units of Work
- Composing with the song using instruments occurs in some Units of Work
- Through our teaching, we will excite and intrigue our children to find out more about different historical periods in music, genres, styles and the works of great composers and musicians.
- Use of musical vocabulary will allow children to; describe the inter-related dimensions of music and describe what they like and/or dislike about a piece of music
- Teaching from specialist music teachers allows children to learn to play and perform using a range of tuned instruments.
- Visits and performances from trained musicians gives the children the opportunity to; listen to a range of musical genres and instruments and appraise them, using musical vocabulary.
